Useful vocabulary

Outskirts

Outskirts = the outer part of a city or town (not near the centre).

"It's not exactly on the **outskirts**, but it's not close to the city centre either."

Residential (area)

An area that people live (not a commercial area- where people shop).

"It's a relatively quiet, **residential** neighbourhood."

Greenery

Green area like parks and gardens, for example.

"What makes it so nice is that there is a lot of **greenery** dotted around the area."

Dotted around (the area)

In small sections around the area (like dots).

"What makes it so nice is that there is a lot of greenery dotted around the area."

Hustle and bustle

Busy activity (usually in a city).

"I used to live in Shanghai, so living here is a welcome change from the **hustle and bustle** of city life."





Formally meet

Officially meet.

"To be honest, I don't see my neighbours so often, and we've never formally met."

Keep myself to myself

Be a private person (also with "himself", "herself", etc.).

"I've passed them on my way into the apartment, and we usually say "hi", but they tend to **keep** themselves to themselves."

Isolated

Not near anything else (alone).

"In contrast, living in Dundrum seems a bit more isolated."
